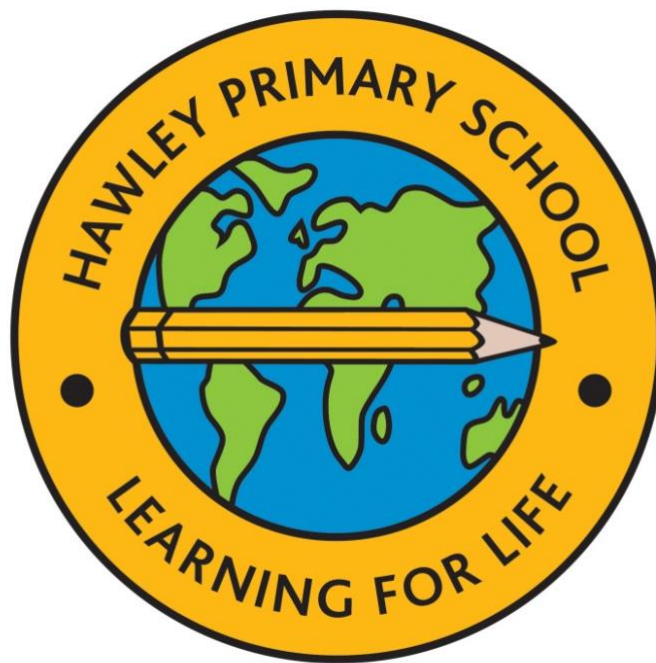

Our commitment

The safety and wellbeing of every child at Hawley Primary School is our highest priority. We aim for all our pupils to feel safe, happy and supported throughout their time with us.

Safeguarding is everyone's responsibility. All staff, governors and volunteers are trained to recognise signs that a child may need help or protection, and to respond appropriately.

What safeguarding means

Safeguarding includes:

- Protecting children from maltreatment
- Preventing harm to children's health or development
- Ensuring children grow up in circumstances consistent with the provision of safe and effective care
- Taking action to enable all children to have the best outcomes

How we keep children safe

Support for families

If you're worried about your child or need support, please talk to us. We're here to help and can signpost you to additional services if needed. In some circumstances, we may need to share information with social care or other agencies to keep children safe. We will always aim to discuss this with you first, unless doing so would put the child at greater risk.

If you are concerned about a child's welfare, please record your concern, and any observations or conversation heard, and report to one of the DSLs as soon as possible on the same day.
